

A Profile of the Jesuits of the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay at the Time of the Expulsion in 1767

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Who were the members of the Society of Jesus who staffed the missions and colegios in the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay at the time of the expulsion? Several documents that reported on the process of the expulsion provide the basis for a prosopographic (collective biography) reconstruction of the profile of the missionaries at the time of the expulsion. The first is a list of the Jesuits who embarked on ships to go into exile in Europe.¹ It is not a complete list of the members of the Society of Jesus in the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay at the time of the expulsion. For example, it does not include the Jesuits who died in route to the port of Buenos Aires, which was the main point of departure. Nor does it include the small number of Jesuits who remained in the Americas for health reasons. Rather, it lists those who boarded ships to go into exile, the names of the ships used to transport the Jesuits, those who died during the voyage, and those who arrived in Spain pending transport to the Papal States. The second document is a 1775 report that summarized the outcome of the expulsion, contains the most accurate accounting of the number of Jesuits in the Americas, those who died up to the point of the drafting of the report, and those who were fugitives. It also includes information on the costs incurred in expelling the Jesuits, and the pension paid to some but not all of the exiled Jesuits.²

The Jesuits who survived and made it into exile in the Papal States maintained a shadow provincial organization that was a manifestation of collective identity, even after the suppression of the Society of Jesus in 1773. Diego González maintained a register of the former Jesuits from the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay that included birth

and death information where available, the date of entry into the Society of Jesus, and where they had been stationed at the time of the expulsion.³ The González catalog was not the only one. Rafael Zeliz, S.J., for example, also maintained a similar catalog for the ex-Jesuits who had been members of the Province of New Spain.⁴ In 1980, Hugo Storni, S.J., published a compendium of biographical information on the Jesuits in the Province of Paracuaria based on the González catalog and other contemporary sources.⁵

How many Jesuits were in Spanish America at the time of the expulsion order? The 1775 report that summarized the outcome of the expulsion contains the most accurate information on the number of Jesuits in the Americas, and those who died up to the point of the drafting of the report in October of that year. It also includes information on the costs incurred, and the pension paid to the exiled Jesuits. It also includes a list of those who were fugitives.⁶ This document contains the most complete record of the number of Jesuits in Spanish America and the Philippines (a dependency of New Spain) at the time of the expulsion. According to the report there were 2,267 members of the Society of Jesus in Spanish America on April 1, 1767, and 2,727 in Spain. There were six provinces in Spanish America in 1767. They were Peru (1568), New Spain/Mexico (1572), Paracuaria/Paraguay (1607), Nueva Granada (Colombia and Venezuela)(1611), Chile (1683), and Quito (Ecuador and Panama)(1696).⁷

Recent studies have documented the profile of the Jesuits in Spanish America at the time of the expulsion, and one of the central findings is the growing numbers of members recruited locally. Aliocha Maldavsky documented the growing numbers of American-born Jesuits in Peru in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. In the period immediately following the arrival of the Jesuits in Peru in 1568, the majority were European-born, but

the number of American-born increased during the seventeenth-century. In 1576, for example, 13.7 percent of the Jesuits in the province of Peru were American-born, but this number increased to 23.4 percent in 1613, and 52.4 percent in 1637. Maldavsky also found considerable mobility among the Jesuits.⁸ Alexandre Coello de la Rosa analyzed the decision made in 1572 by the Peruvian provincial to recruit some criollos and mestizos into the Society of Jesus.⁹ In another study Coello de la Rosa analyzed the development of the indigenous doctrina Cercado established on the edge of Lima within the city walls, and that later became a colegio.¹⁰ Mexican scholar María Cristina Torales Pacheco analyzed a general 1750 report on the Society of Jesus that included its organization and membership, and found that the majority of Jesuits in the Province of New Spain were American-born.¹¹ In 1995, the Austrian historian Bernd Hausberger published a German language biographical dictionary of the Jesuits from central Europe (the German Assistancy) in Mexico.¹² There was a similar pattern in the Province of New Spain (Mexico, Cuba, Guatemala). Pablo Abascal Sherwell Raull documented the presence of European-born in the sixteenth century, but a growing number of creoles by the seventeenth century.¹³ My own recent study documented and analyzed the profile of the Jesuits of the Province of New Spain in 1767.¹⁴ However, the majority of missionaries on the northern of Mexico, and particularly the more recent establishments in California and Sonora, were European-born. In contrast to the profile of the Jesuits in Peru and New Spain, the majority of the

Jesuits stationed on the colegios and missions in the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay were European-born, and most were from Spain.

The Robles-Muriel Expedition

The Jesuit leadership periodically sent veterans from the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay to Spain and Europe to recruit to cover the staffing needs of the province. At the time of the implementation of the expulsion decree Jose Robles, SJ, and Domingo Muriel, SJ, were in Spain with a group recruited to go to the Rio de la Plata. Robles was a native of Jaen in Spain, and was 59 years old in June of 1767. He went into exile in the Papal States, and died in Genoa (Italy) on February 14, 1789 at the age of 79. Muriel was a native of Tanames in Spain, and was and was 49 years of age in June of 1767. He also went into exile in the Papal States, and died in Faenza (Italy) on January 20, 1795 at the age of 76. The 28-year-old Juan Eguia, a native of Buenos Aires, was also a member of the expedition. He may have gone to assist Robles and Muriel, or may have already been in Spain. Eguia also went into exile in the Papal States, and died in Rome on May 11, 1787 at the age of 48.

Robles and Muriel had recruited 80 young men in Spain. Muriel sent half ahead to the Rio de la Plata, where they were arrested in Montevideo and returned to Spain.¹⁵ The rest were waiting to sail for South America when they were arrested. At the time of the expulsion royal officials gave the individual Jesuits the option to leave the Society of Jesus. The record shows that some of the Jesuits recruited by Robles and Muriel went into exile in the Papal States. One died at sea, and a second died in Corsica, presumably in-route to the Papal States. Another 22 died in different cities in what today is Italy, including Faenza, Bolonia, Rome, and Genoa. Six died in Spain, and may have remained in Spain at the time of the expulsion or may have returned in the late 1790s when the Crown allowed some ex-Jesuits to return from exile in the Papal States. There is no information on the place of death of 35 members of the Robles-Muriel expedition, and it is likely that they chose to leave the Society of Jesus in 1767.

The Jesuits stationed on the Missions

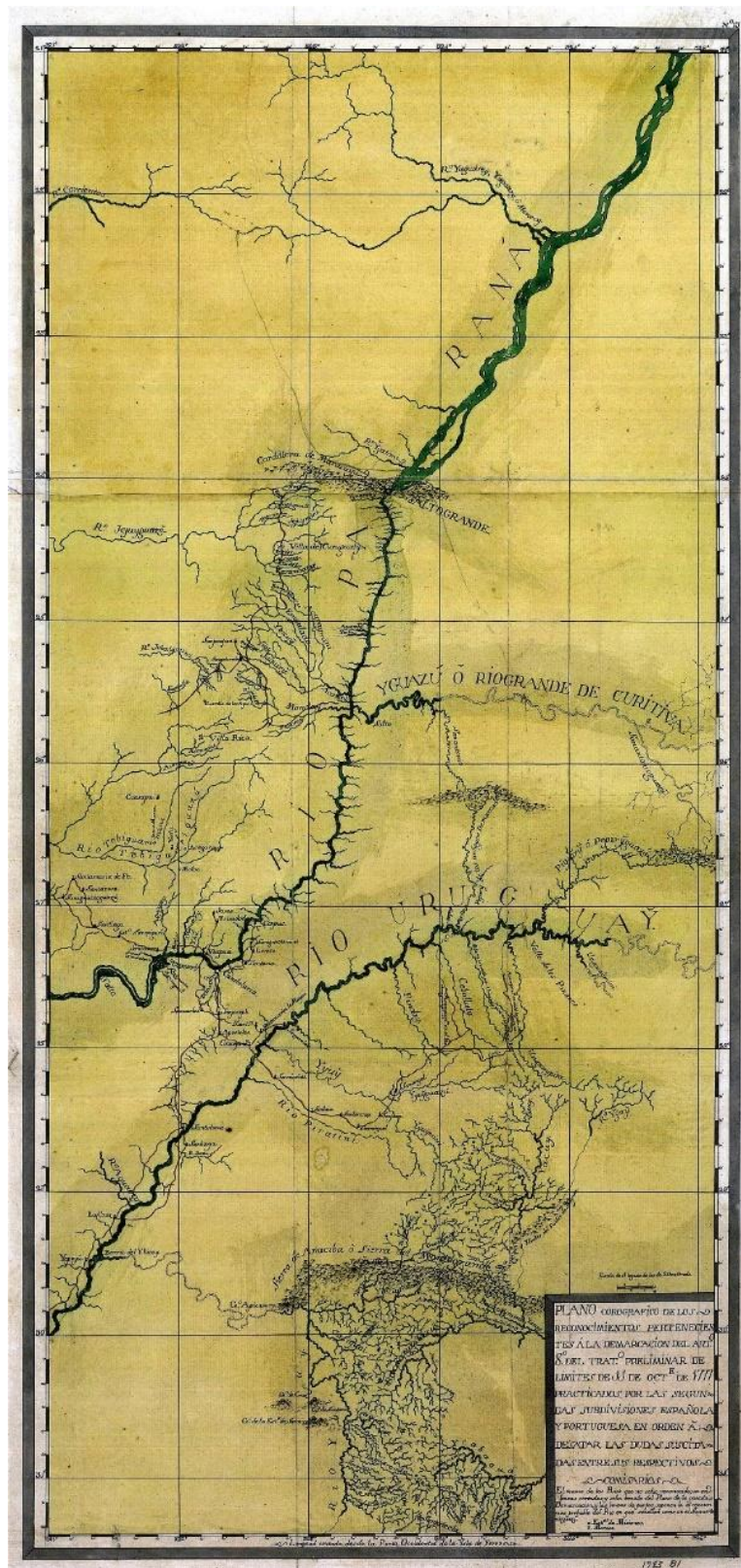


Figure 1: A c. 1787 map of the Guaraní, Chaco, and Tarima Missions. Library of Congress, Washington, D.C.

At the time of the expulsion the Jesuits administered three groups of missions in the larger Rio de la Plata region documented in a map from the late 1780s that showed the Guaraní and Tarima missions (see Figure 1). The oldest group were the missions among the Guaraní. The first was established in 1609, and at the time of the expulsion they numbered thirty. These were populous communities with a sophisticated urban plan as shown in a c. 1754 diagram of Mission San Juan Bautista (see Figure 3). The most populous of the thirty missions was Yapeyú with some 8,500 residents in 1768, which was almost as large as the population of Buenos Aires.¹⁶ The Jesuits also administered the two Tarima missions (San Joaquin and San Estanislao) as a part of the Guaraní missions. These two missions dated to the 1740s, and were active *congregaciones* meaning that the Jesuits continued to resettle non-Christians on the mission communities (see Figure 3). The second group of missions were those in the Chaco region established among non-sedentary indigenous peoples such as the Abipones who did not adapt well to sedentary life. The Chiquitos missions located in what today is eastern Bolivia were similar to the Guaraní missions in terms of social organization and urban plan. At the time of the expulsion there were ten mission communities (see Figure 4).

Joining the Society of Jesus was a lifetime commitment, and most joined as teens. The Diego González noted the date of entry into the Society, and is used to calculate the age on joining (see Table 1, Graph 1). Of a total of 476 Jesuits for which an age on entering the Society could be calculated, 26 (5.3 percent) joined between the ages of 10 and 14. Another 243 (49.6 percent) entered between the ages of 15 and 19, and another 138 (28.1 percent) between the ages of 20 and 24. A small number entered at a later age. This pattern is consistent with other regions in Spanish America, such as the Province of New Spain.¹⁷

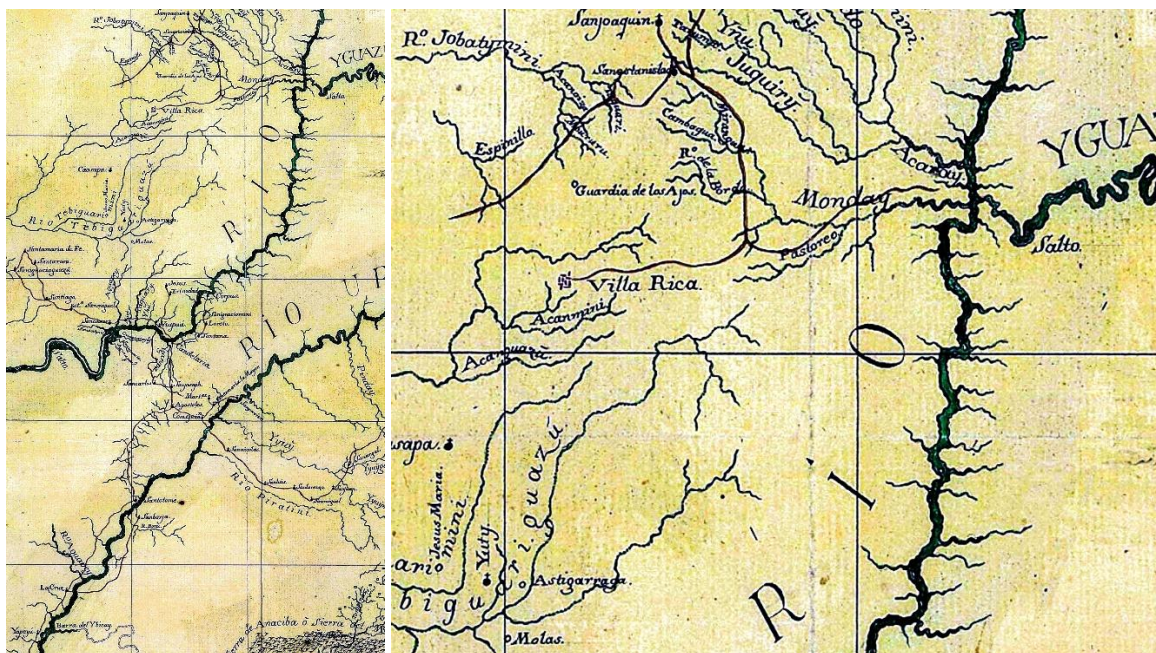


Figure 2: Detail of the map showing the Guaraní and Tarima missions.

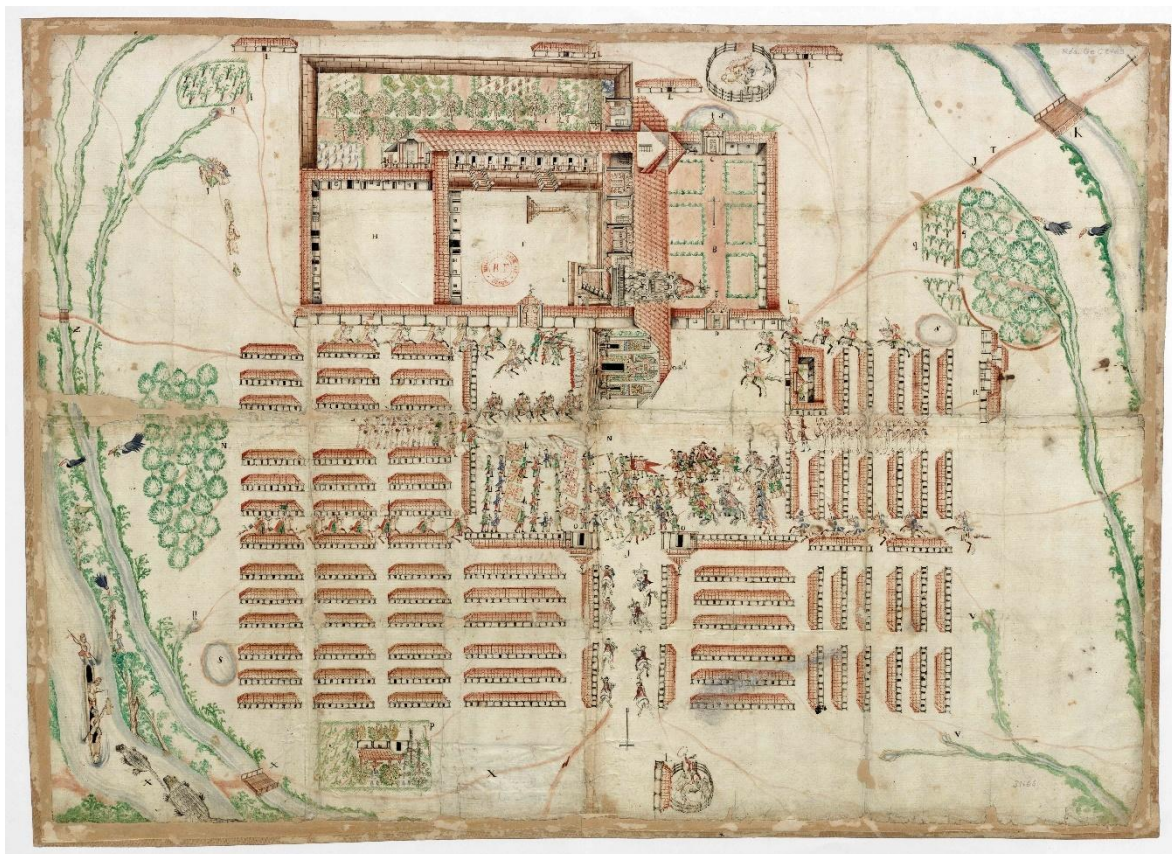


Figure 3: A c. 1754 diagram of Mission San Juan Bautista showing the typical urban plan of the Missions among the Guaraní. Biblioteque Nationale de Franca, Paris.

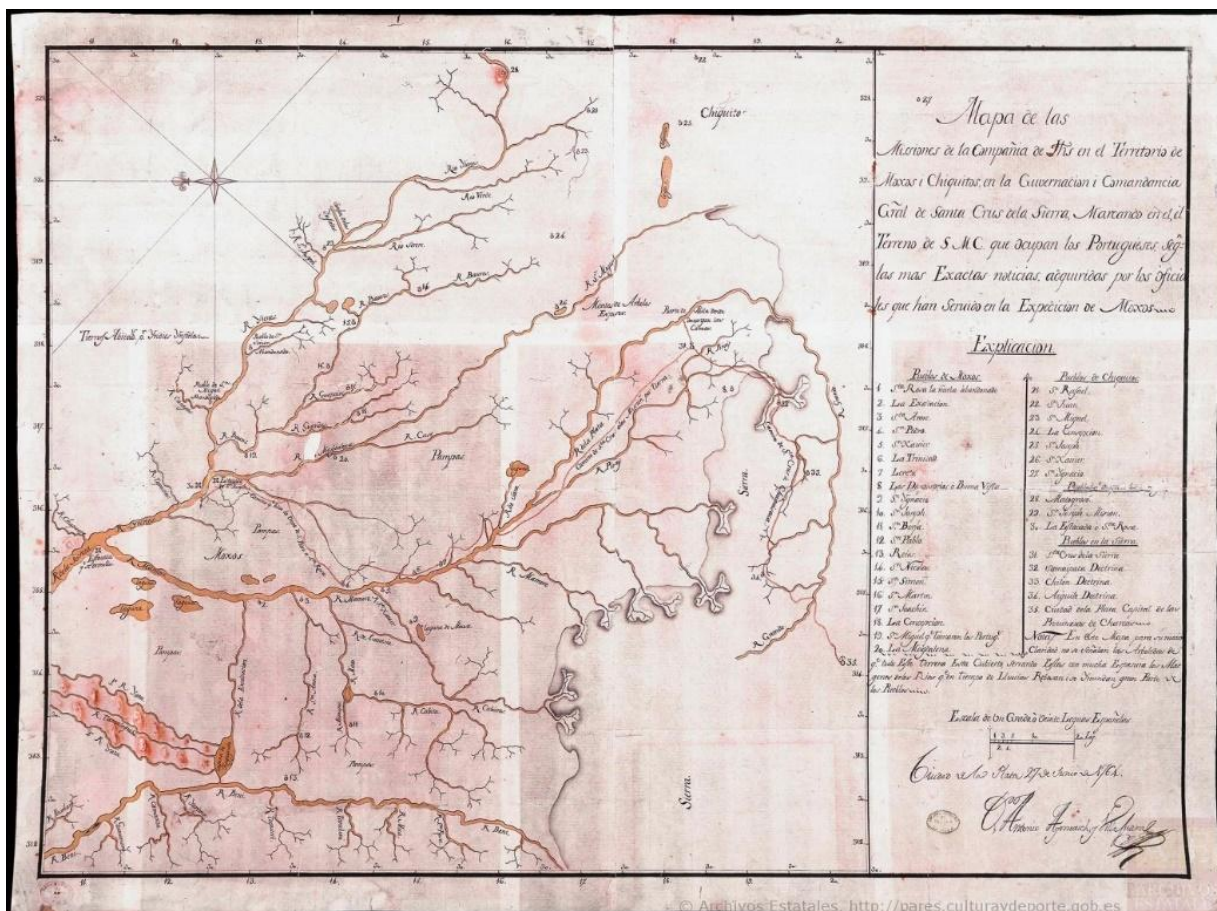
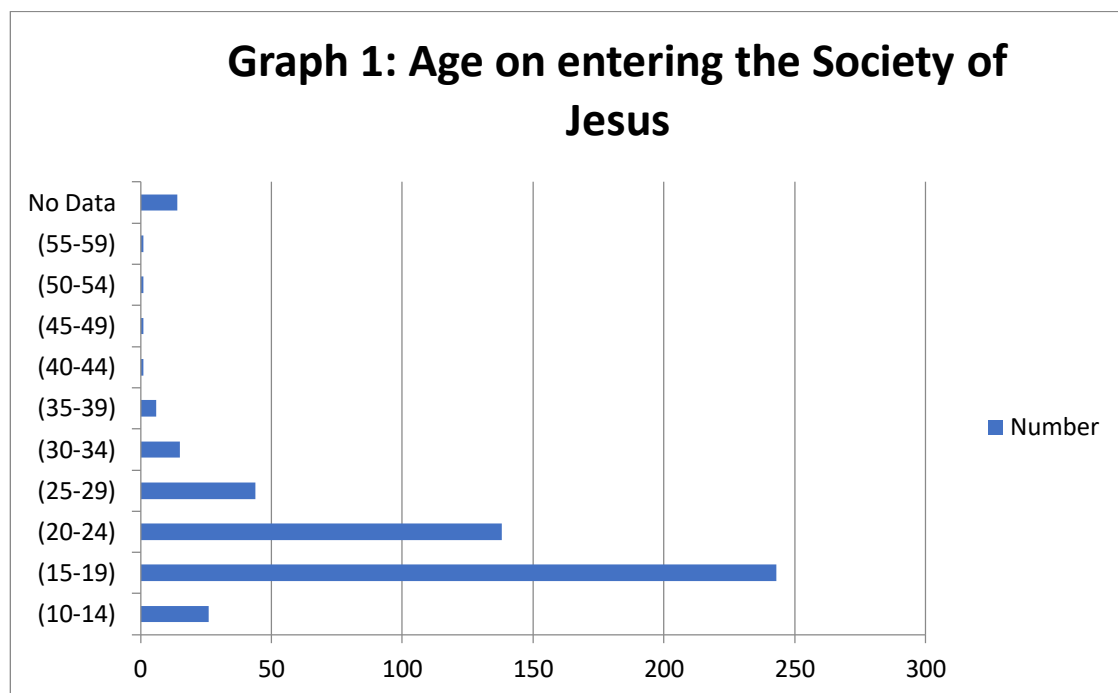


Figure 4: A 1764 map of the Chiquitos and Moxos Missions administered by the Province of Peru. Archivo General de las Indias, Sevilla, Spain.



As noted above, the Jesuits recruited American-born *criollos* in other jurisdictions such as New Spain and Peru. The pattern was different in the Province of Paracuaria. The majority of the missionaries were from Europe. A total of 45 (51.1 percent) of the Jesuits stationed on the Guaraní-Tarima missions were natives of Spain. Another 29 (33 percent) came from other parts of Europe. Only 14 (15.9 percent) were natives of Spanish America, including from what today are the countries of Argentina, Paraguay, Chile, and Mexico (see Table 2, Graph 2). The presence of Spanish-born Jesuits was even greater on the Chaco missions. A total of 22 (76 percent) were from Spain, another three (10.3 percent) from other parts of Europe, and only four (13.8 percent) from the Americas (see Table 3, Graph 3). The figures for the Jesuits stationed 22 Jackson, Creole Jesuits, 178-180. on the Chiquitos missions show that 16 (64 percent) were from Spain, six (24 percent) from other parts of Europe, and three (12 percent) from the Americas (see Table 4, Graph 4).

At the time of the expulsion in 1767, the majority of the Jesuits stationed on the Guaraní-Tarima missions were middle-aged and older veterans, and there was a similar pattern with some differences on the Chaco and Chiquitos missions. The analysis here of the age structure focuses on three larger cohorts: younger members in the 25-39 age group; middle-aged in the 50-59 age group; and older men above the age of 60. The dependence on personnel from Spain and other parts of Europe to staff the colegios and missions posed

problems in terms of getting replacements to the region. Spain was involved in wars during the early and mid-eighteenth century, and most recently during the later phase of the Seven Years War (1755-1763). Spain entered the conflict in 1761 as an ally of France. This posed two possible problems, the disruption of sailings from Europe, and the Spanish government prohibiting Jesuits from countries it was at war with from coming to the Americas.¹⁸ Of the Jesuits stationed on the Guaraní-Tarima missions in 1767, 48 (54.6 percent) were in the 40-59 age cohort, and another 26 (29.6 percent) were above the age of 60 (see Table 5, Graph 5). For the Jesuits stationed on the Chaco missions there was a different pattern. A total of 15 (51.7 percent) were younger men in the age 30-39 cohort, and 14 (48.3 percent) between the ages of 40-59 (see Table 6, Graph 6). The age profile of the Jesuits stationed on the Chiquitos missions shows a mix of younger men and older veterans. There were six (23.1 percent) in the age 15-39 cohort, 11 (42.3 percent) between the ages of 40 and 59, and nine (34.6 percent) over the age of 60 (see Table 7, Graph 7).

Graph 2: Country of origin of the Jesuits stationed on the Guarani-Tarima Missions in June of 1767

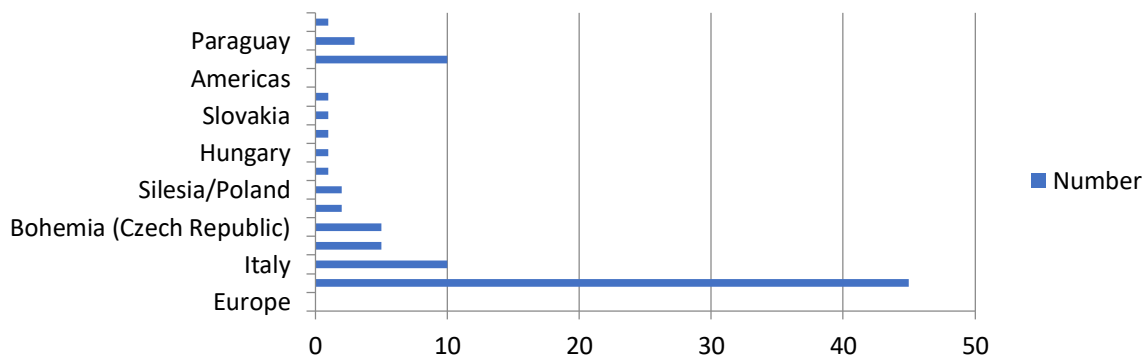
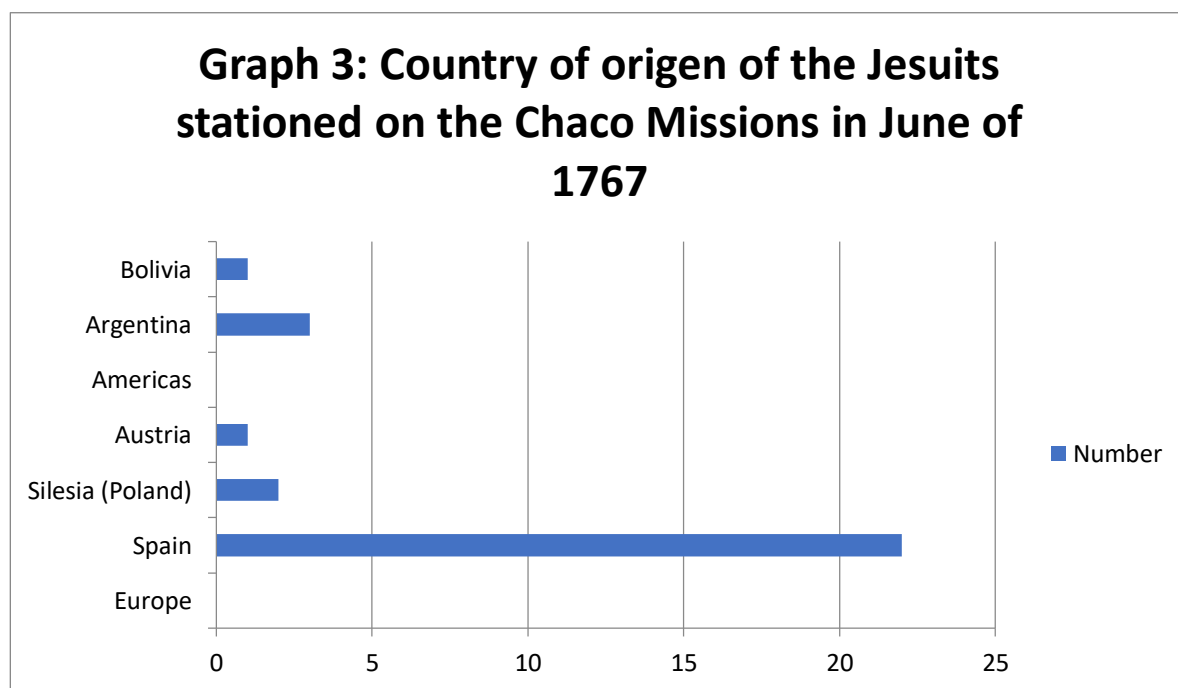
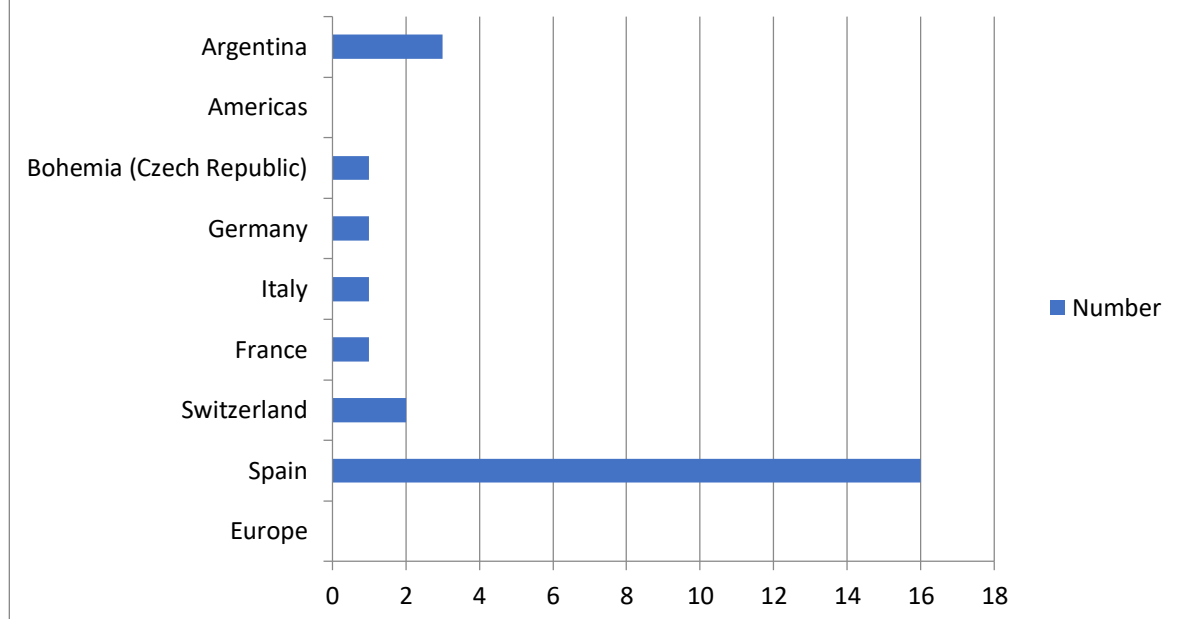




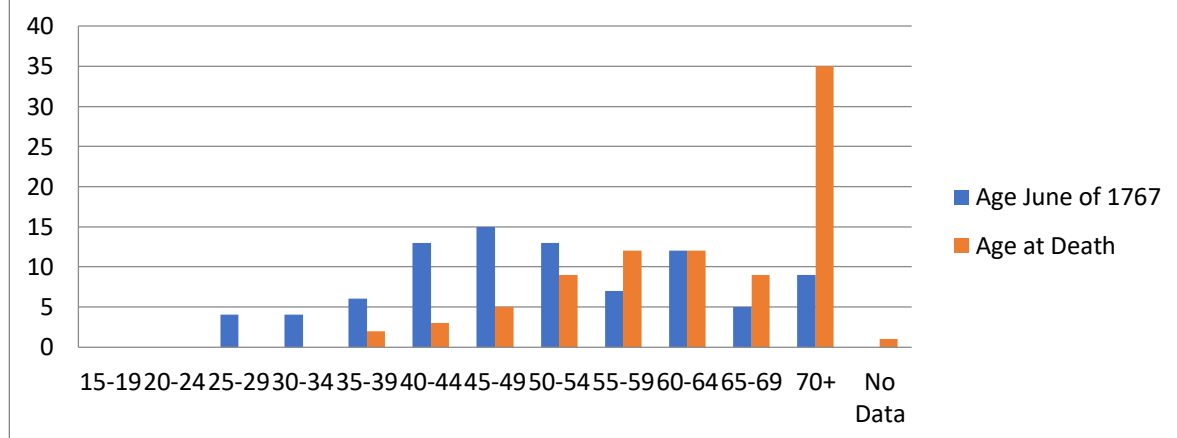
Figure 6: A painting by the Chaco missionary Florian Paucke, S.J. (1719-1779), showing Jesuits students.



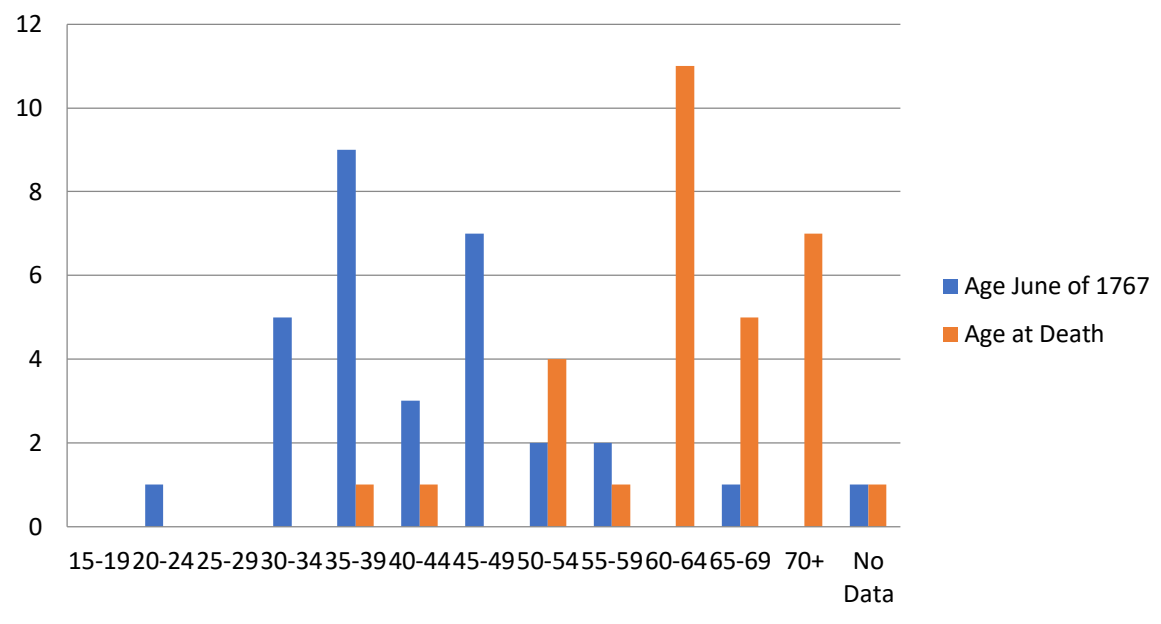
Graph 4: Country of origin of the Jesuits stationed on the Chiquitos Missions in June of 1767



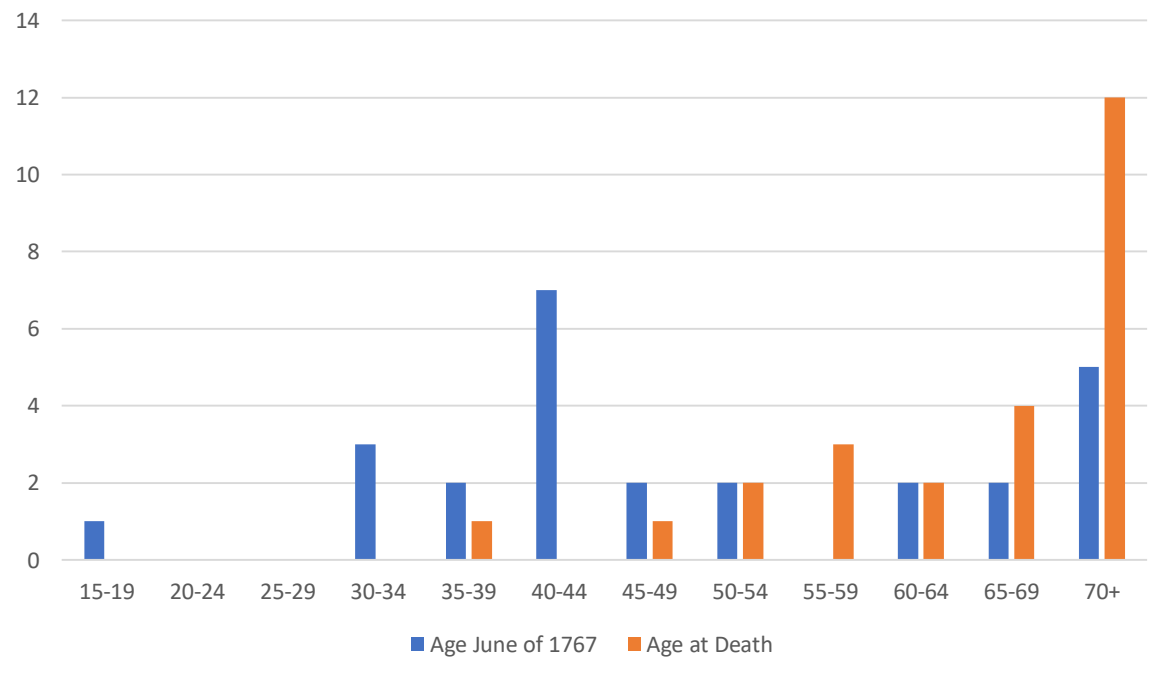
Graph 5: Age in June of 1767 and at death of the Jesuits stationed on the Guarani-Tarima Missions

The Jesuits were an elite group that lived longer at a time when the MLE was low, and a large percentage lived beyond age 60 and many into the 70s. A total of 29 (33 percent) of the Jesuits on the Guaraní-Tarima missions died between the ages of 40 and 59, and another 56 (63.6 percent) over the age of 60. For those on the Chaco missions six (20.7 percent) died between the ages of 40 and 59, and 23 (79.3 percent) over the age of 60. The largest number of those stationed on the Chiquitos missions, 18 (72 percent) died over the age of 60. Another six (24 percent) died between the ages of 40 and 59. In other words, the Jesuits were an elite group that lived longer than most people in the eighteenth century.

The Jesuits Stationed on the Colegios of the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay

As was the case of the missions in the Province of Paracuaria, the majority of the Jesuits stationed on the colegios were European-born (67.3 percent). A total of 240 (65.8 percent) were natives of Spain. The rest came from different parts of Europe, including what today is Germany, Italy, France, and England (see Table 8, Graph 8). A smaller number (22.5 percent) were creoles born in the Americas. The largest group (61) were from what today is Argentina, and mostly from towns where the Jesuits operated colegios such as Buenos Aires y Santiago del Estero. A smaller number were from other regions, including eight from what today is Paraguay, four from Tarija, Bolivia, and two from Chile. There was one Jesuit from New Spain, and a second from Brazil who may have been an exile from the 1759 Portuguese expulsion of the Jesuits.

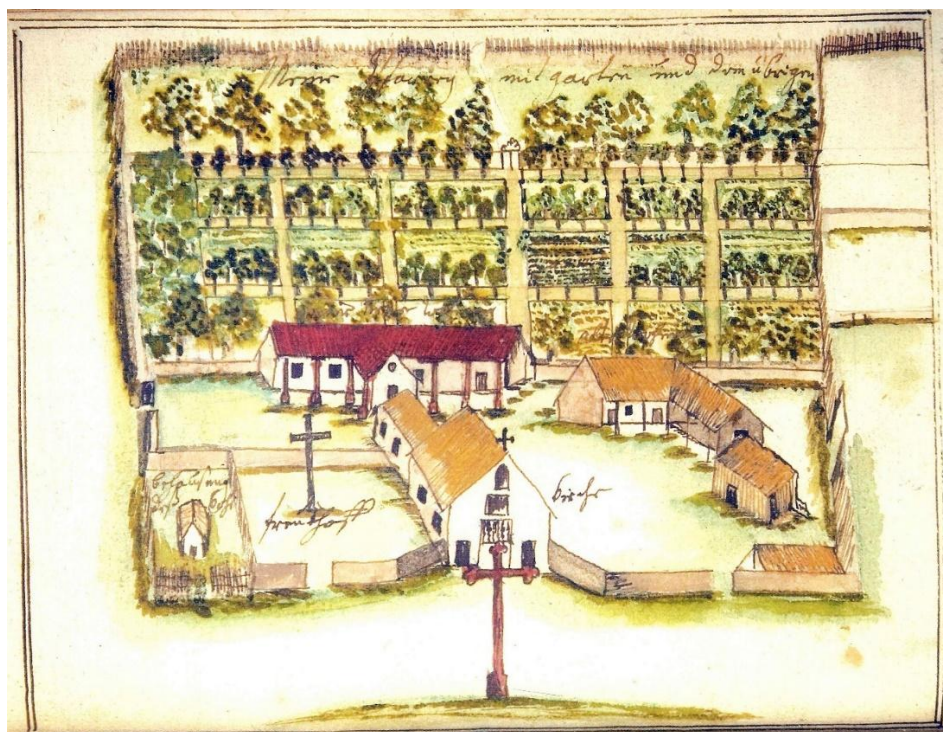
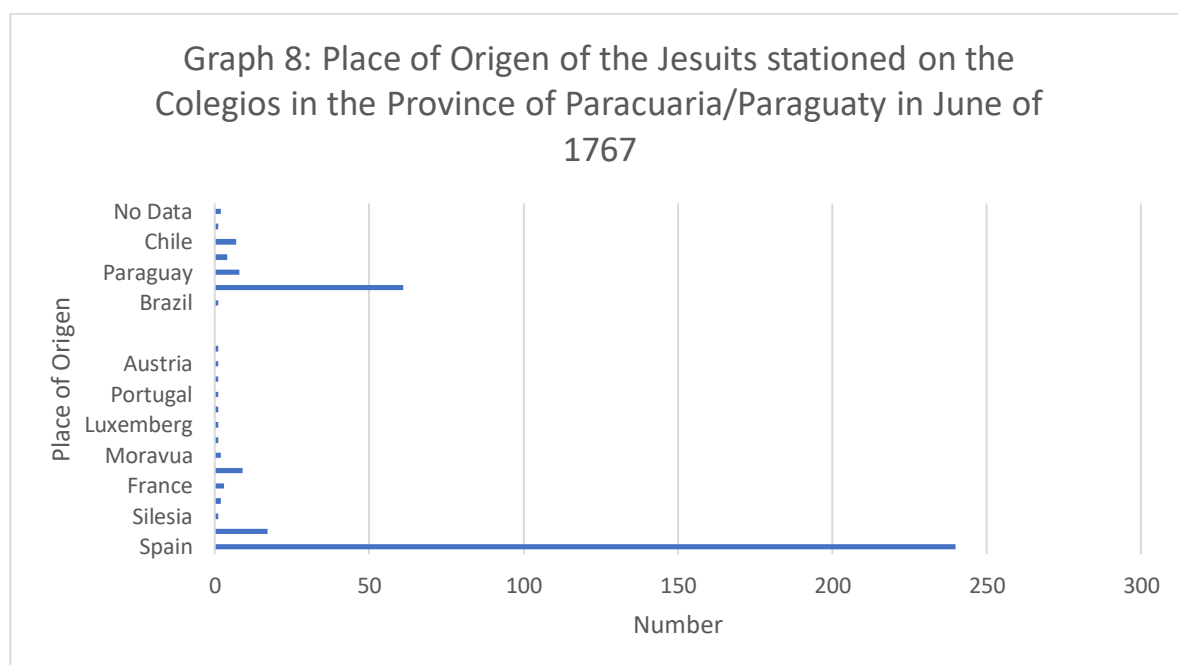


Figure 7: The painting by Florian Paucke, S.J. (1719-1779), showing the Chaco Mission San Francisco Xavier de Mocovies that he administered prior to the expulsion.



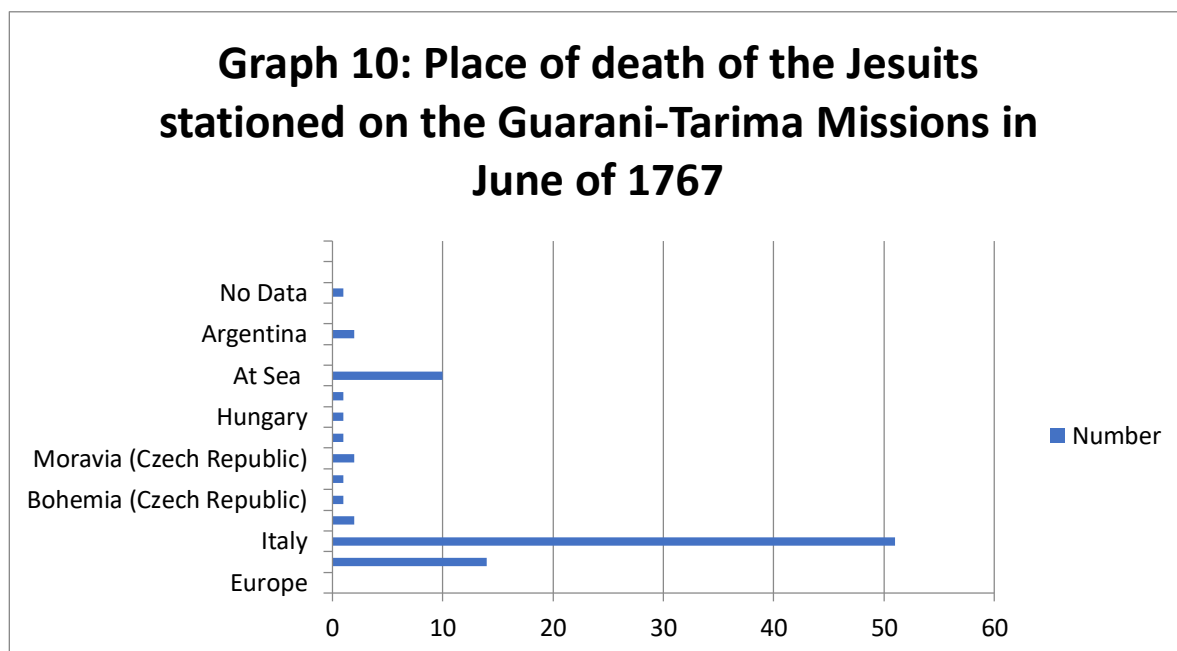
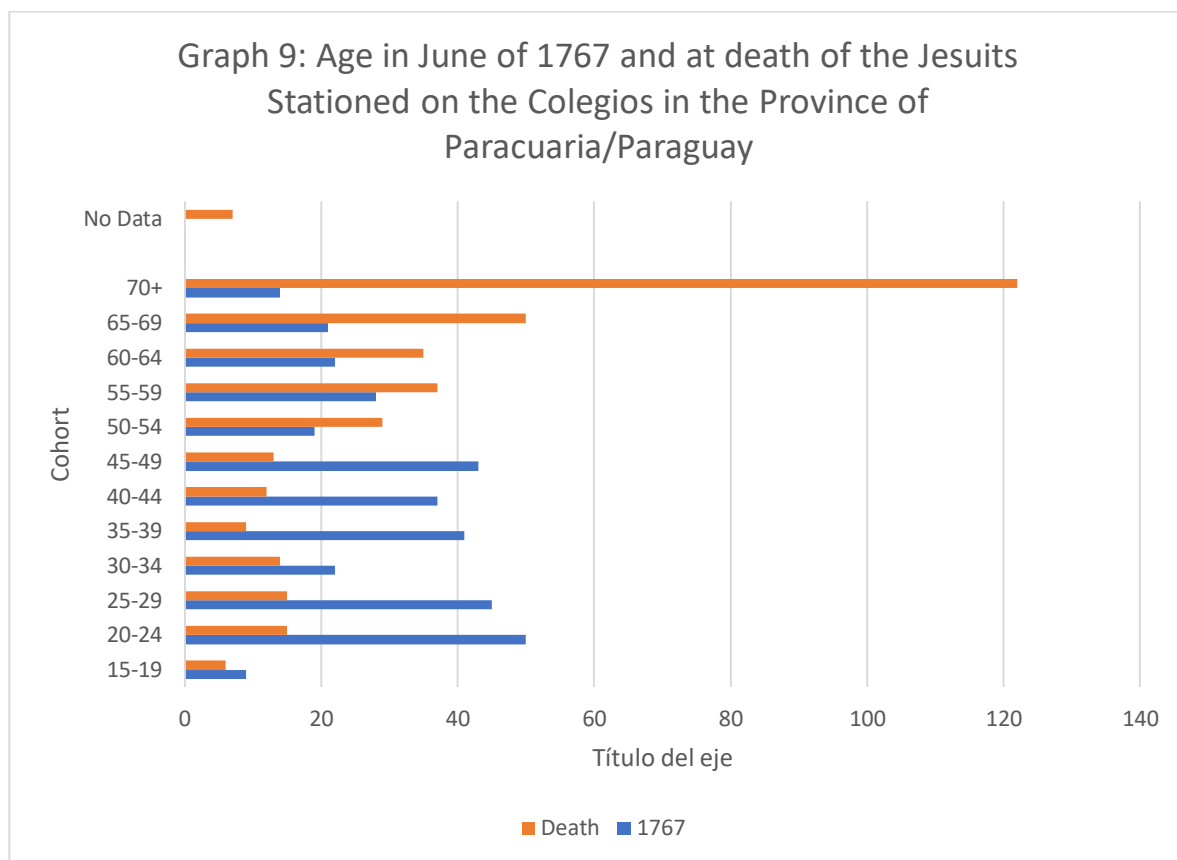
The age profile of the Jesuits at the time of the expulsion shows a mix of younger members and older veterans. The age analysis is divided into three broad cohorts: ages 15-

39; 40-59; and age 60+. Nearly half (48.6 percent) were between the ages of 15 to 39. This included novitiates in Córdoba. The second group was the age 40-59 cohort (35.4 percent). The last group was the older veterans over the age of 60 (16 percent). As already noted above, the members of the Society of Jesus were a privileged elite group that enjoyed longer lives than most people in the mid-eighteenth century. A smaller number (22.5 percent) died between the ages of 15 and 39. A quarter (25 percent) died in the age 40-59 cohort. However, the majority (57 percent) lived beyond age 60, and including 122 who lived more than 70 years of life (see Table 9, Graph 9).

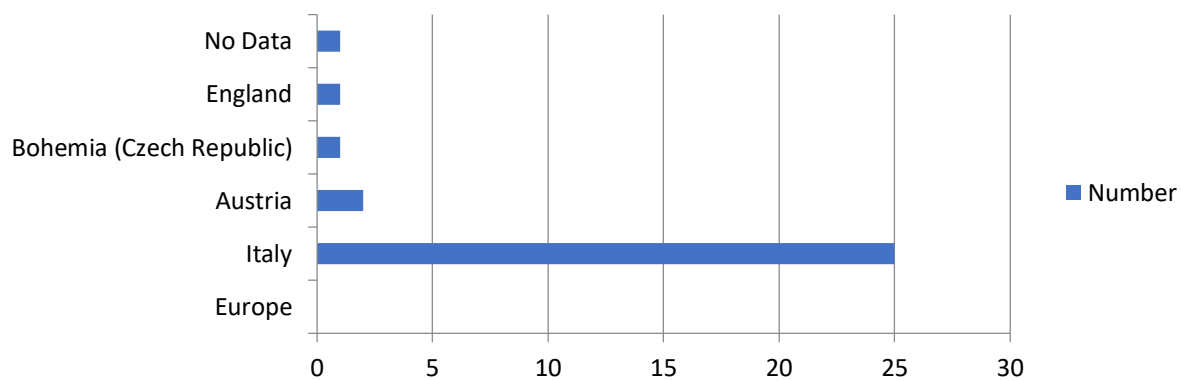
After the Expulsion

The expulsion order stipulated that the Jesuits be sent to exile in the Papal States in what today is Italy. Many of the non-Spanish European-born Jesuits returned to their provinces, and did not receive a pension from the Spanish government. The journey into exile proved to be extremely difficult, and some did not survive. Perhaps the most difficult experience was that of the Jesuits stationed on the Mainas Missions in the Amazonia region. They were sent down the Amazon River to Portuguese Brazil, then to Portugal, then to Spain, and those who survived finally reached the Papal States. A military expedition headed by Buenos Aires governor Francisco de Paula Bucareli visited the Guaraní missions, arrested the Jesuits, and had them sent to Buenos Aires to be sent in ships directly to Spain.¹⁹ The royal decree contained a provision that those too ill or infirm to travel could remain. The Austrian Segismundo Aepcker remained at Apóstoles Mission, and died there in 1772. The Spaniard Andrés Fernández died at San Ignacio Mini Mission in October of 1767. A total of 51 of the exiled Jesuits from the Guaraní-Tarima Missions died in the Papal States (see Table 10, Graph 10).

Graph 12: Place of Death of the Jesuits stationed on the Chiquitos Missions in June of 1767

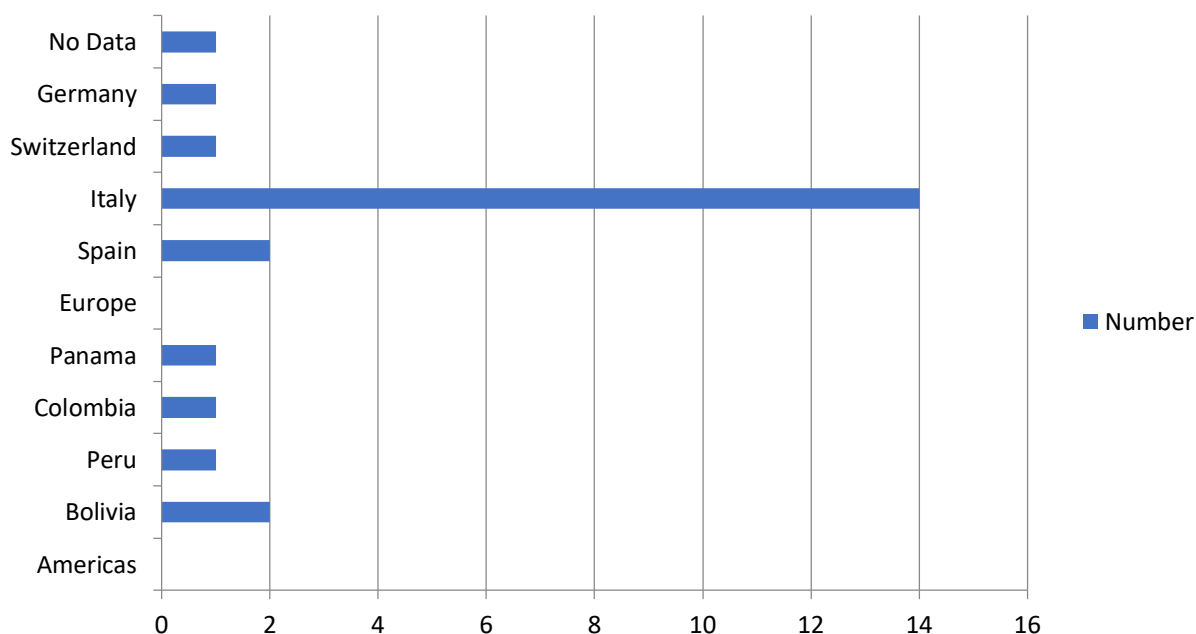
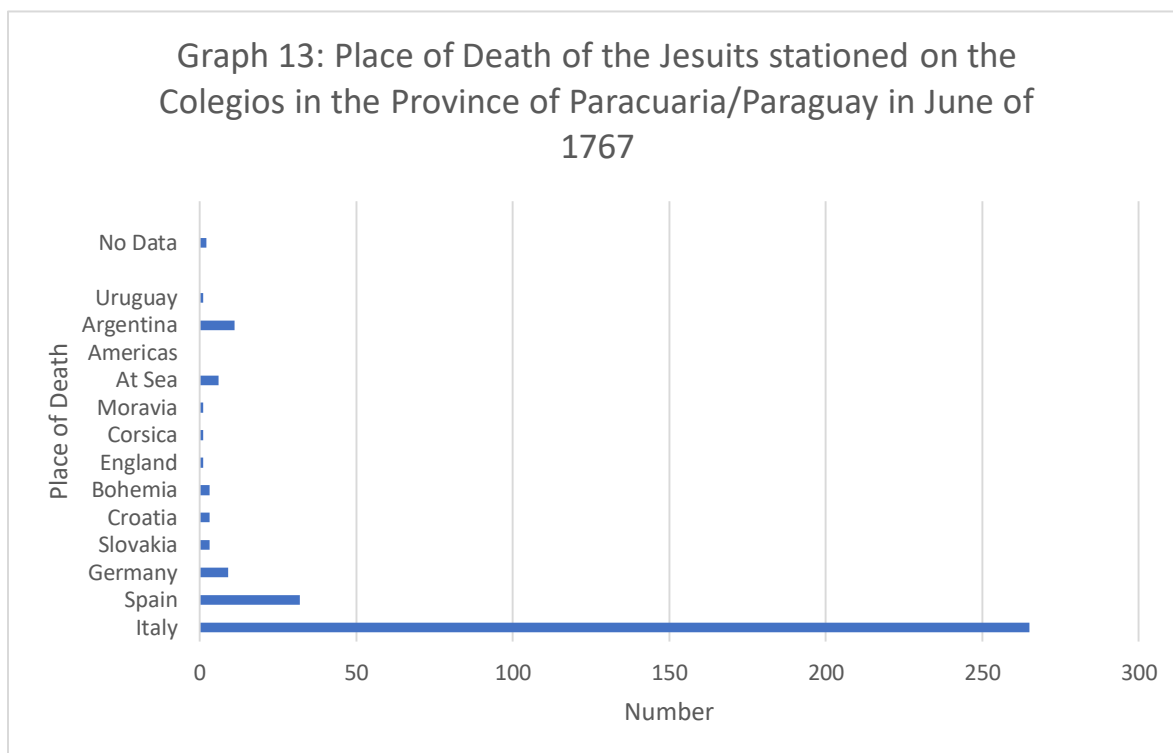




Figure 8: Cities in the Papal States that hosted exiled Jesuits.



Following the Jesuit expulsion from Spanish America, those in exile in the Papal States maintained a form of provincial structure. The González catalog was an effort to maintain the records the provincials had maintained prior to the expulsion, and was similar to the catalog started by Rafael Zelis for the exiled Jesuits from the Province of New Spain.²⁰ Following the Papal suppression of the Society of Jesus in 1773, the exiled ex-Jesuits maintained the provincial structure, although with different names. In the case of the ex-province of New Spain, the ex-Jesuits changed the name to the Province of New Spain. Following the suppression the ex-Jesuits maintained the catalogs, and kept track of the former Jesuits who had been stationed on the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay for decades. In the late 1790s, a small group of American-born ex-Jesuits attempted to return illegally to New Spain. They were arrested at different points, but died in the Americas instead of in exile in the Papal States.²¹ There was no similar incident involving ex-Jesuits from the

Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay attempting to return to the Americas. Those who reached exile in the Papal States ended their lives there.

The profile analyzed here demonstrates that the majority of Jesuits who staffed the missions and urban colegios were from Europe, and the largest group of European-born were from Spain. Unlike the Jesuits from the Provinces of New Spain and Peru where the majority were American-born at the time of the expulsion, only a minority of those in the Province of Paracuaria/Paraguay were American-born from what today is Argentina, Paraguay, Chile, Mexico, and Brazil. Local recruitment was insufficient for staffing needs. It also shows what happened to the Jesuits following the expulsion. The majority survived the trip into exile in the Papal States in what today is Italy, and died there. The smaller number of American-born Jesuits also lived out their lives in Europe. A small number of non-Spanish Europeans returned to their respective provinces.
